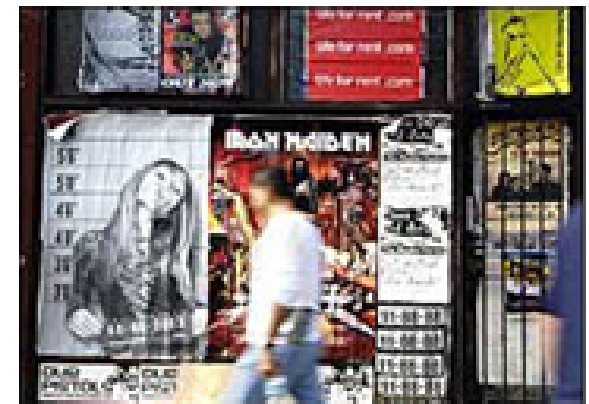
How the law defines ASB

A legal definition according to the Crime and Disorder Act 1998- is

Section 1(1) of the Act defines *acting in an anti-social manner as a manner that caused or was likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to one or more persons not of the same household as the complainant.*

Anti Social Behaviour Orders

- *Aged 10 years or older**
- *Civil order - but a criminal offence if breached**
- *Conditions include curfews, not associating with named persons, not entering a certain area, not behaving in a certain manner**
- * ASBOs cannot order an individual to take positive steps**
- * Able to name and shame those with ASBOs**
- *Lasts minimum of 2 years**

JAMIE COOPER



On Monday 28th June 2004 an Anti-social Behaviour Order (ASBO) was imposed on **Jamie Cooper of 27 West Park Road, Windmill Park Estate, Southall** by Acton Youth Court. This was the result of an application made by the Ealing Council and Ealing Borough Police in partnership with Notting Hill Housing Group.

The conditions imposed by the Anti-social Behaviour Order state that Jamie's activities and movements are restricted. These restrictions can be viewed overleaf and will be in place until 27th June 2006.

A breach of any of the Anti-social Behaviour Order conditions, outlined overleaf, leaves Jamie open to arrest.

The conditions imposed by the Anti-social Behaviour Order state that Jamie Cooper will;

- Not enter **HALLIDAY SQUARE, COMER CRESCENT, THE COMMUNITY CENTRE** (including the Car Park and Caged Area), **NEW EALING HOSPITAL / ST BERNARDS HOSPITAL** building or grounds (except in an emergency) or **MACDONALDS** Uxbridge Road Southall (next to the Iron Bridge).
- Not to use threatening, abusive or insulting words to anyone in England and Wales.
- Not to behave in an abusive, violent to threatening way to anyone in England and Wales.
- Not to commit or attempt to commit any criminal offence in England or Wales.
- Not to damage, threaten to damage or take property belonging to anyone in England and Wales.
- Not to cause physical harm or endangering any other person in England or Wales.
- Not to associate with **Saleh MOHAMMED**.
- Not to remain on any premises in England or Wales occupied, when asked to leave by a person or persons with authority for those premises.
- Not to interfere or communicate with any person whose evidence has been lodged at court during these proceedings.
- Not leave his home address of 27 West Park Road, between 2000pm and 0700am unless accompanied by one or both his parents.

A breach of any of the Anti-social Behaviour Order conditions, outlined above, leaves Jamie open to arrest.
